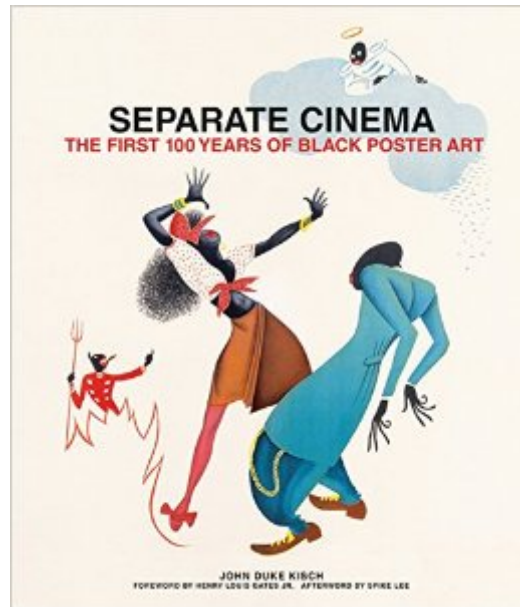

Back in 1992 I got a paperback book on early black movies titled *A Separate Cinema*, which celebrated 50 years of black films. Now, from the UK (available in US from), comes a gorgeously illustrated book with a similar title: *Separate Cinema: The First 100 Years of Black Poster Art* (Reel Art Press). This heavy (five pounds!) hardbound 320-page volume is bursting with colorful reproductions - and informative text - of rare international editions of film advertising. Because many black films - especially pre-1955 - were musicals (or featured black entertainers), there a lot here for the record collector as well as the movie and black culture fan. The posters for films like *New Orleans*, *Stormy Weather*, and *Hallelujah* jump right off the page. This is a quality book and one you'll look at often.
